Electronic Records Management System and scanning paper

Need to scan paper into ERMS?

Three easy steps:

1. Scan as PDF, 300dpi and greyscale (or colour if there are graphics which need colour to be understood)
2. Check that you've scanned all the text – particularly if the document is double-sided!
3. Retain the original paper for 4 months, then dispose of in a confidential recycling bin.

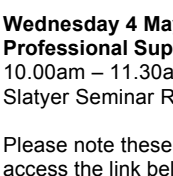

Recommendations from Circ Coord 13/04/2016

- Email notifications from Sierra
 - Begin automated notifications from Sierra as soon as possible. First live test is happening 14/04/2016. If that is successful then we'd like to have the rest operational within the next fortnight
 - Escalate work on the new notification warnings.
- Add student cards to the list of 'valuable lost property' so they're dealt with in the same manner as wallets and money.
- Statistics
 - Chris Williams to perform an audit of how each branch does their circulation statistics. She will work with Vanessa Galloway on the Reserve statistics component, and with the Circulation people at each branch. This is with an aim to standardise all circulation statistics collection
- Staff record Sierra loads
 - The group has a preference for a separate staff and student record to prevent issues with lost card barcodes to be still in the system
 - Christian to approach Mark about further details in the staff load including protecting fields, a way of including the VDX ID, if we'll receive notifications/loads when staff members cease employment, what fields we can edit in staff accounts
- Supplementary hours forms: if a staff member works extra hours in a branch, that location is responsible for filling out the sup hours form
- Overriding loan limit: only to be performed by a circ supervisor if returns haven't been processed. All other cases must be referred up.

Australian National Data Service

DOI service expanded to include grey lit



Australian institutions can now use the ANDS DOI minting services (Cite My Data) to assign Digital Object Identifiers (DOI) to 'grey literature', ANDS has announced.

This includes work not conventionally published, such as theses, reports, unpublished conference papers, newsletters, creative works, preprint journal articles and technical standards.

The scope expansion has been made in response to a request from the Council of Australian University Librarians (CAUL), filling a community need to persistently reference and cite this type of work.

Public inquiry into access and use of data

The Australian Productivity Commission has [launched an inquiry](#) into access and use of public and private data. The scope of the inquiry will consider:

1. the benefits and costs of making datasets more available
2. options for collection, sharing and release of data
3. ways consumers can use and benefit from access to data
4. how to preserve individual privacy and control.

Whilst not specifically focussed on research data, the inquiry does make numerous references to the research sector in its terms of reference.

Submissions are due by 27 July, with a final report expected in March 2017.

SIS Activity 2016.

Thanks to Hui and everyone who contributed to the first quarter statistics – they are now on the website. Some highlights comparing the first quarter this year to the same time last year:

- Basically steady attendance and use of research skills courses and activities
- Use of digital collections +136.9%
- Titles published by ANU Press +4%
- Archives collection use +151.9%
- Total number of visitors to library buildings +3.2%
- Number of enquiries +19.4%
- Library collection
 - E resource use +29%
 - Print collection use -13.6%

Report on Demand Driven Acquisition project in 2015.

We have evaluated the Proquest DDA activity that was undertaken last year. The report is [online](#). Key findings:

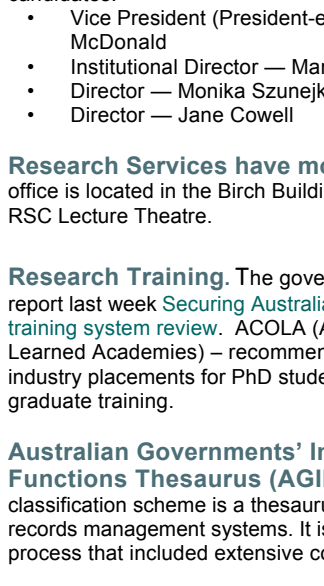
- 3346 short term loans at an average cost per short term loan of \$24.64. This is less than a rush inter-library loan and gave library clients immediate access to the monographs they wished to access.
- 254 titles were purchased, with an average use of each title (mean) of 20.13 and an average cost per book of \$147.90.
- 59 per cent of monographs selected by library clients were reused (4750 uses of autopurchased titles) a
- the advantages of DDA were immediate access to full text resources on request, with titles used 4 up to 311 times.
- although most titles were in the humanities and social sciences disciplines, use of the science titles selected was relatively high and a number of law titles were also selected and used
- future DDA should consider the content and price for various packages and be undertaken with regular review of price and impact on teaching and research

Innovations in the Parliamentary Library

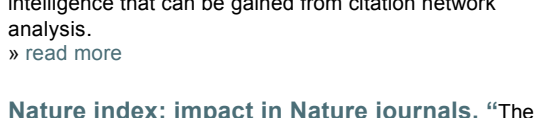

Stephen Bosch and Kittle Henderson have produced this years report under the title *Fracking the ecosystem*. "The 2017 serials marketplace will continue to see steady increases in prices, with no major changes in the contrary... the 6% average price increase seen in 2016 is expected to remain fairly constant for 2017, with perhaps a very slight downward trend hovering in the 5.5% to 6.5% range. Six percent seems to be a level of inflation that is neither too much for libraries to bear nor too little for publishers to accept."

Library Contributions to Student Learning and Success Networks.

This new report for ACRL highlights the evidence for library contributions to student learning and success. What are these you might ask? The more than 60 project reports showed that:

1. *Students benefit from library institutions in their initial coursework.* Information literacy initiatives for freshmen and new students underscore that students receiving this instruction perform better in their courses than students who do not.
2. *Library use increases student success.* Students who use the library in some way (e.g., circulation, library instruction session attendance, online databases access, study room use, interlibrary loan) achieve higher levels of academic success (e.g., GPA, course grades, retention) than students who did not use the library.
3. *Collaborative academic programs and services involving the library enhance student learning.* Academic library partnerships with other campus units, such as the writing center, academic enrichment, and speech lab, yield positive benefits for students (e.g., higher grades, academic confidence, and retention).
4. *Information literacy instruction strengthens general education outcomes.* Libraries improve their institution's general education outcomes and demonstrate that information literacy contributes to inquiry-based and problem-solving learning, including critical thinking, ethical reasoning, global understanding, and civic engagement.

Survey of Innovations in Scholarly Communication Faculty.

A new Emerald survey from over 1000 authors. Scholarly findings are:

- Three quarters of scholars use ResearchGate to archive and share their publications
- 18% of scholars use OA routes to publish
- Just over half of scholars use tools to communicate to an audience outside academia. Twitter is used by 38% of scholars for this purpose
- Most scholars access literature through institutional resources, but as many as 61% use ResearchGate
- Over half of scholars responding to the survey were using EndNote as their preferred reference management tool

On the Marginal Cost of Scholarly Communication.

From the abstract "We assessed the marginal cost of scholarly communication from the perspective of an agent looking to start an independent, peer-reviewed scholarly journal. We found that various vendors can accommodate all of the services required for scholarly communication for a price ranging between \$69 and \$318 per article. In contrast, if an agent had access to software solutions to replace the services provided by vendors, the marginal cost of scholarly communication would be reduced to the cloud infrastructure cost alone and drop to between \$1.36 and \$1.61 per article. Incidentally, DOI registration alone accounts for between 82% and 98% of this cost." You will agree and disagree with much in their analysis – possibly in equal quantities. No matter what you will agree with the need for more experimentation.

"I am more productive in the library because it's quiet".

Mariana Regalado and Maura Smale have produced a very insightful report "Of all locations on a college campus, the library has perhaps the strongest institutional expectation as a place where independent academic work occurs. Studies of behavior in libraries have found that students equate going to the library with doing schoolwork, indeed, going to the library has long been considered as a ritual critical to true academic engagement...While there has been much recent research on typical use of library spaces, commuter colleges – which typically encompass community colleges – are underrepresented in the literature...We recently concluded a qualitative study of the scholarly habits of undergraduates at the City University of New York (CUNY) to learn about how they fit schoolwork into their days, the challenges and opportunities they encountered, and what the experience meant to them. We heard from students about several locations in which they engaged in their academic work, and this article discusses the ways that the college library did – and did not – fit into their academic landscapes. For many CUNY students, the college library is a critical component of their academic lives; however, we also met students who expressed frustrations with using their college library for academic work ("by the presence of others or the traces of others' activities".
