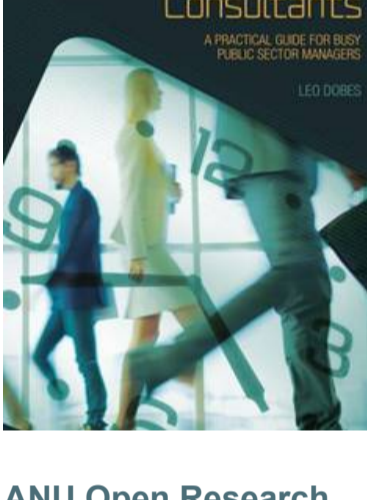
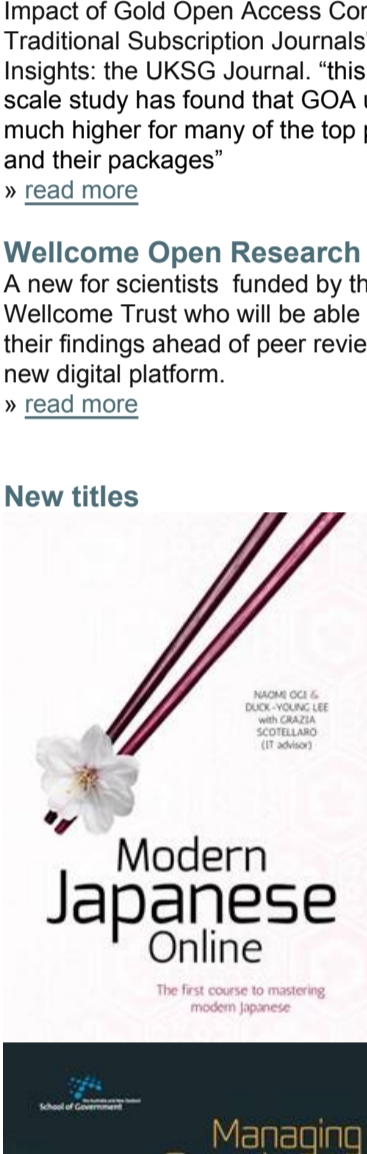

Altmetrics. The Altmetrics team at Nanyang Technological University wanted to determine whether researchers' activities on the Kudos platform were actually helping to increase publication metrics such as usage. What did they find – well explaining and sharing of publications via Kudos correlates to 23% higher downloads of the full text on the publishers' websites. Where to they share? Facebook was more popular than Twitter and LinkedIn.

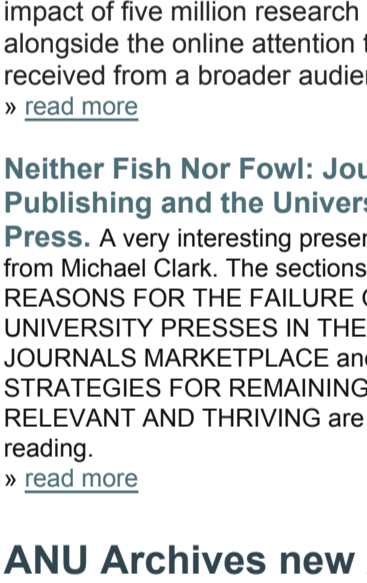

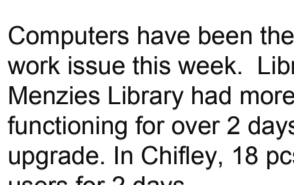
University Education Committee: At UEC issues discussed included:

Library changes/issues: Marianna has with great help from Allied Pickfords, TLCSS and Library staff managed the move of the books under the major leak on level 4 in the Menzies Library to the front of the Library. Almost 15,000 items were relocated. The items, which included sections of the Menzies general collection (level 4) and Japanese serials (level 3), can now be found in the former office space on level 4, at the front of the building.



In Chifley, Library buckets were required, together with plastic over the shelves on level 4. A temporary fix has been put in place.



Computers have been the most significant service and work issue this week. Library and Archives staff in Menzies Library had more than 20 computers not functioning for over 2 days after the data network upgrade. In Chifley, 18 pcs were not available to library users for 2 days.

Indigenous data. This week the Library participated small invitation-only workshop on Monday 4th July 2016 at Western Sydney University - Honouring Our Songlines: Research Data and the Living Narrative.

The workshop focused evolving technological landscape in relation to data, concerns regarding the custodianship of knowledge and data relating to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples and communities. It started a conversation about the ways we as institutions can move forward and develop a framework and guidelines for appropriate practice. It was convened by Professor Lisa Jackson Pulver, Pro-Vice Chancellor Engagement and Aboriginal & Torres Strait Islander Leadership who is an amazing leader.

Federal election: The ALP announced before the election that, if elected, a Labor government would commit \$12 million of funding over four years to the National Library's Trove platform: The Coalition announced at if it won the election, it will invest \$50 million to improve the digital literacy of senior Australians and improve their safety online. We'll see what happens.

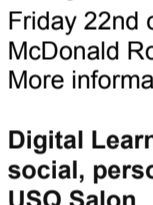

"e sets out the three areas where universities can improve performance while remaining true to core commitments to teaching and learning and research; improving core operations, identifying and analysing all activities and costs and integrating everything into a comprehensive budget. His model empowers individual operating units through to all-of-institution decision makers to choose on the basis of information not opinion or aspiration. "Many people within the academy seem to believe that mission should trump margins ... while many others worry about financial viability and sustainability ... the new model provides insights about the cases in which mission should rule and, in any case, what the impact of 'doing this thing' on other outcomes will be," he writes." LITA's Top Tech Trends. The panelists were Blake Carver, LYRASIS; Lauren Comito, Queens (N.Y.) Library; Laura Costello, Stony Brook (N.Y.) University; Carolyn Coulter, PrairieCat Library Consortium; and Nick Grove, Meridian (Idaho) Library District. I enjoyed the summary of the key technologies libraries should be using to improve tech literacy:

- *Coulter*: Tech petting zoos.
- *Comito*: Little round robots ([Sphero](#)) to overcome tech fears. When tech is cute, it's easier to incorporate.
- *Grove*: We've had a good response to those robots.
- *Costello*: We often loan programmable robots to faculty for educational programs.
- *Coulter*: But make sure you use mobile device management software to clean off devices when they are returned

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arXiv@25: Key Findings of the User Survey. The prevailing message is that users are happy with the service as it currently stands. 95% of survey respondents said that they are very satisfied or satisfied with arXiv. Furthermore, 72% of respondents indicated that arXiv should focus on its main purpose, which is to quickly make available scientific papers, and this will be enough to sustain the value of arXiv in the future. This theme was pervasively reflected in the open text comments. A significant number of respondents suggested keeping to the [core mission](#) and enabling arXiv's partners and related service providers to continue to build new services and innovations on top of arXiv.

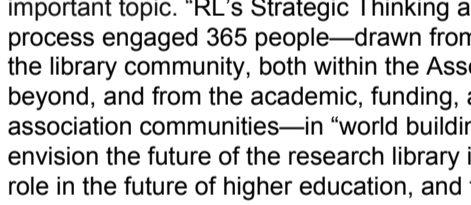

Linked open data for digitised special collections. The presentation with Case Studies from the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign is now online. S Timothy W. Cole and Myung-Ja K. Han are the presenters.

Description: Today digitized special collections play a major role in humanities scholarship and pedagogy. When well-connected such collections can better achieve contextual mass, enable complex connective research, and support the collation and contextualization of physically dispersed primary sources. This Webinar will describe the in-progress enrichment and transformation of metadata describing two digitized image collections at the University of Illinois. We will describe the challenges of turning metadata strings into URIs, discuss the expressiveness and our use of schema.org, detail how we map traditional metadata into schema.org RDF, and outline how we plan to provide users with new functionalities that leverage increased connectedness and integration with other Linked Open Data resources..

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FOIA Improvement Act. On July 1, ALA President Julie Todaro released a statement applauding Congress' passage on June 14 and President Barack Obama's signing on June 30 of the [FOIA Improvement Act](#) into law. The bill will improve [public access to government documents](#) by codifying the



"presumption of openness" declared by President Obama in his [Freedom of Information Act \(FOIA\) memo](#) during his first week in office and will strengthen the US Office of Government Information Services....!

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
