Copyright. Fair Use and Story time Helen Thomson, University of Melbourne - Most Australian public libraries hold a weekly pre-school story time. They are loved by parents and children and valued by the community. But under current Australian copyright law, these story times are most likely infringing copyright. Reading a picture book aloud would be

considered a public performance, and absent a specific exception or fair use, would constitute a possible infringement. It is possible that story

time would be covered under s 200AB but

Researchers' Use of Scholarly Collaboration Networks. A new survey provides an updated view of how and why researchers are using scholarly collaboration narlie Rapple reports assumption that people share via SCNs primarily for convenience (rather than because of specific intent to undermine traditional publishing models) may be given some substance by the finding that 83% of respondents agreed or strongly agreed that copyright should be respected. The attitudes to copyright suggested by the survey may be surprising: on balance, respondents considered publisher copyright / sharing policies to be: "straightforward" (48%, vs 34% "confusing"), "fair" (39%, vs 27% "not fair") and fit for purpose (44%, vs 23% saying policies "do not serve their purpose adequately")".

Natalya Sharina, Director of the Ukrainian Library of Literature in Moscow. IFLA has issued a number of <u>statements</u> expressing concern over Natalya's case – she was arrested for the incitement of ethnic hatred and animosity after a raid on the Library in October 2015, when it was alleged that books banned by the Russian state were found in the Library. Since then it has been reported that the Library of Ukrainian Literature has been closed. IFLA continues to maintain contact with Natalya's lawyer who has indicated that the prosecution case has now been completed, and the defence will start to put their case shortly. A decision is likely later in the spring. In the meantime, Amnesty International's call for urgent action from November 2016 has been followed up by a
