Policies updated.

In preparation for the University's transition to self-insurance a number of procedures have been finalised following an extensive consultation process and are now available within the [Policy library](#).

Of these fifteen procedures, several are new to the ANU and outline the planning, measurement and review processes in place to ensure the effective functioning and continuous improvement of the WHS Management System.

These procedures form the basis of the University's WHS Management System upgrade and have been developed or updated to comply with the [National Audit Tool \(NAT\)](#), a set of mandatory criteria used by Comcare to assess a self-insurers WHS Management System.

A number of the procedures also incorporate additional detail to support the launch of the new Workplace safety incident and hazard reporting tool (Figtree), which from July 1 replaced HORUS as the University's online reporting and incident management tool.

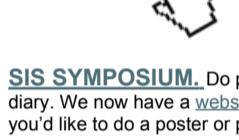

Copyright Act. The changes from the Copyright Amendment (Disability Access and Other Measures) Bill 2017 will take effect in December 2017. Important changes for us include:

- **Streamlined statutory licence.** The statutory licences in Parts VA and VB of the Copyright Act (the Act) will be replaced by one simplified statutory licence. This model was recommended by the Australian Law Reform Commission in its 2014 *Report into Copyright and the Digital Economy*. A provision in the new licence makes it expressly clear that universities will not need to rely on the statutory licence if another exception would be available.
- **Disability copying:** The existing disability statutory licence will be replaced by a new fair dealing exception. This enables universities to make format-appropriate versions of educational materials for students with disabilities, without the need to rely on a statutory licence.
- **Exam copying:** The exam copying exception in s 200 of the Act currently only applies to print exams, the changes extend this to include online exams.

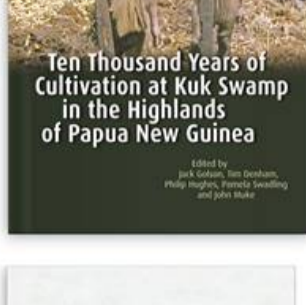

Librarians' perspectives on the factors influencing research data management programs.

In the article, titled "Librarians' perspectives on the factors influencing research data management programs," Ixchel Faniel and Lynn Conaway examine factors that influence librarians' ability to support researchers' needs. Findings from interviews with 36 library professionals in the US identify five major factors of influence: 1) human resources; 2) communication, coordination and collaboration; 3) technical resources; 4) leadership support; and 5) researchers' perceptions of the library. Faniel and Conaway give context to librarians' role in campus RDM and the emerging research around this topic, and then explore in depth the findings that show how different aspects of the above five factors facilitate or constrain RDM activity.

A reputation economy: how individual reward considerations trump systemic arguments for open access to data.

Fecher et al in *Palgrave communications* report on a survey of 1564 mainly German researchers from all disciplines. They find overall a good awareness of the benefits of open access to research data but that practice reflects limited open data practice. Individual rewards conflict with widespread data sharing. They make policy suggestions taking into account individual reward considerations and scientific progress.

Economics and access.

Walt Crawford has engaged in thinking about open access for many issues. In this latest issue of *Cities & Insights*, he reviews many reports published in 2016 and 2017 that place open access within and economic debate. He starts with [GOAJ2: Gold Open Access Journals 2011-2016](#) noting cost findings include:

- Half a million gold OA articles may have cost \$420 million in APCs, or about \$803 per article.
- More than 220,000 articles appeared in journals that don't charge APCs
- A dozen publishers with around 200,000 articles account for \$349 million (\$1,709 each), while several thousand with more than 318,000 articles account for \$71 million (\$222 each).
