the ADB's inception was also a product of the

'great Australian silence', an era when Indigenous Australian people were largely overlooked by historians, who, as William Edward Hanley Stanner evocatively explained, constructed a partial view of Australia's past that excluded Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people. The legacy of this exclusion is that, today, Indigenous Australian people only represent 1.5% of all ADB entries, or 210 in total. Moreover, for the earlier period of 1788 to 1940, this drops to a mere 32, or only 0.4% of all The Australian Research Council supported project, 'An Indigenous Australian Dictionary of Biography', aims to redress this historic exclusion by working collaboratively with the ADB and both Indigenous and non- Indigenous scholars to produce 190 new biographies of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people, and increase the inclusion rate to a more representative 3% In this lecture, Dr Shino Konishi charted how the ADB has addressed Indigenous lives in the past, and draw on other national dictionaries of biography for insights into new conceptions and practices of Indigenous biography. This analysis will suggest new directions for how we might produce a more inclusive ADB in the future,




