Deselection. Over the coming months we will be deselecting material to be able to accommodate the collection rebuild project for Chifley Library. The material will not be able to be stored on Level 1 and consequently there will be much work on level 3 and 4 and Hume Repository. In addition the Hancock Library basement has a risk factor and we will move material we do not wish to be at risk out of the basement. While we will use the criteria previously approved by the Library Advisory Committee (LAC), we are refining them slightly and will seek LAC advice and your advice. The proposed approach is:

We will deselect print serials duplicated with perpetual access agreements at the Print Repository to make space items being relocated from the branches

We will deselect duplicate superseded texts and relocate first edition (if any research value)
