- Preparing for copyright term changes in 2019 issues by NSLA this will be my weekend reading!
- The Department of Communications and the Arts has released submissions to the consultation paper for the exposure draft of the Copyright Amendment (Service Providers) Regulations 2018 (the Regulations). The exposure draft makes changes to the Copyright Regulations which are consequential to the Copyright Amendment (Service Providers) Act 2018 (the Act) that extends the copyright safe harbour scheme to organisations and institutions in the education, cultural and disability sectors. The amendments are intended to ensure that the newly defined service providers will be able to comply with the current requirements in Regulations. The Act will commence on 29 December 2018, and the Regulations are expected to commence at the same time.

What's new in scholcomm

Elsevier. David Matthews reports on the disputes with German and Swedish universities. He notes: " month after being cut off from new Elsevier articles, librarians in Sweden have reported only a handful of complaints, while in Germany, institutions said that they have had to deal with relatively few requests for blocked papers. In Sweden, libraries have been without access to content published since 30 June after the country's university negotiating consortium decided in May to end its contract with Elsevier because of rising costs and what it saw as an insufficient offer on open access. In Germany, meanwhile, talks over a new national contract that had dragged on unsuccessfully for more than a year and a half broke down last month over similar issues, and libraries have been without access to new material since 10 July'

These new versions contain a few small but important tweaks to ensure that any gaps in an agency's compliance with the Australian Government Agencies Privacy Code are highlighted at each step as the agency assesses their maturity.

CLOCKSS grows. In this past year, the CLOCKSS Archive has grown by 13 million journal articles, to 30 million, and by 12,000 books, to 72,000. This represents an 80% growth in journal content, and 20% growth in books. The journal growth includes a significant increase in preservation of backfile content. They have triggered 21 more journals for open access, bringing our total to 53 as of July 2018. The community now includes 300 libraries from 13 countries.
