



As part of the ANU Library Pink Ribbon Morning Tea we need donations to create the prize boxes for the raffle.


Each year Library staff buy and donate 'pink' items, which are used to create raffle boxes.

CAUL. The CAUL meetings this week included discussion of the governance and procurement reviews and strategic negotiations.

Copyright. New European Copyright Directive approved. Europe's controversial Copyright Directive was approved by the European Parliament on September 12. The controversies centers on two articles, 11 and 13, described as a "link tax" and "upload filter" respectively. The Association of European Research Libraries (AERL) is also concerned that a lack of support for technologies such as text and data mining and artificial intelligence imply a bleak future for research and innovation in Europe. The vote does not pass the directive into law just yet. That happens following a final vote in January, after which individual EU member countries will decide how they want to implement it.



Tales of the unexpected: why archival research remains important today (Noel Butlin Annual Lecture)  
DATE: Tuesday, 9 October 2018 from 5:30 pm to 7:00 pm  
VENUE: McDonald Room, Menzies Library

For the contemporary researcher, archival research is often considered antiquarian and too labour intensive to meet the publication demands of the modern corporate university. For the economic historian there is often a choice between long hours spent in the archives and subsequent analysis of scanned documents or obtaining datasets from which to test hypotheses. The tensions between historical and economic methods, both legitimate, run deep in the discipline. Using examples from his own research, Simon Ville will show that working on historical archives is enjoyable, though labour intensive, providing many original and unexpected outcomes. Things aren't always what they appear to be...

Simon Ville is Senior Professor of Economic and Business History at the University of Wollongong, a Fellow of the Academy of Social Sciences in Australia, and a recent member of the College of Experts at the Australian Research Council (2013–17).



Experiments with OCR and early modern texts. OCR technologies were first developed to read printed text, so early modern handwriting poses new challenges. The Folger Shakespeare Library's Early Modern Manuscripts Online project provides access to some of the Folger's 16th and 17th-century English manuscripts through images and highly accurate transcriptions, along with related metadata. This summer the Folger gave the GoogleOCR team a dataset of 100 early modern manuscript letters.

JISC survey on digital literacy. JISC's survey of 37,000 students, released today, shows that half of college learners and almost 70% of university students think digital skills will be important for their chosen career. Yet only 41% believe their courses prepare them for a digital workplace. The poll also finds that two thirds of respondents feel they are not told what digital skills they need before starting a course and less than half agree that they have regular opportunities to review and update their digital skills.

Collaborative research skills. A new blog post on LSE's Impact of Social Sciences blog gives much food for thought. It addresses an important challenge "Undergraduate student training has not necessarily kept pace with the changes in how science is done." They propose a model for explicitly teaching collaborative research, engaging students in meaningful scientific research. They conducted a collaborative science project that engaged faculty advisors and upper-year undergraduates at four institutions across North America. The results suggest the new model is timely and beneficial to frame new approaches.
