#### CLOCKSS

**Succession plan launched.** Researchers, librarians, and publishers look to CLOCKSS and other long-term archives to guarantee that the scholarly record will remain intact in a world where rapid change has become a constant. CLOCKSS is taking steps now, as a strong and stable organization, to formalize its Succession Plan and ensure the enduring survival of the scholarly content it preserves. Four of CLOCKSS's twelve library nodes have agreed to continue to preserve the digital content that is preserved in CLOCKSS, if the organization were to cease to exist. In that unlikely event, Stanford Libraries (U.S.), Humboldt University (Germany), the University of Edinburgh (U.K.), and the University of Alberta Libraries (Canada) would take over the responsibility and the organization for running the LOCKSS software across the CLOCKSS content, to continue preservation for the future. 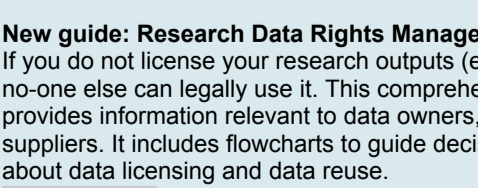

Forgotten Trades showcases 12 diverse occupations represented in union records held at the Noel Butlin Archives Centre:

- Felt hat makers
- Printers
- Confectioners
- Coal & Shale workers
- Railwaymen
- Bakers
- Hairdressers & wigmakers
- Clothing trades
- Undertakers
- Stonemasons
- Shearers
- Furnishers

Nineteen in these industries formed trade unions in the workers in their. They united to campaign for fair pay and conditions, to give support in times of unemployment and ill health, to influence political and industrial policy, and to socialise and celebrate.

Since then, these occupations have changed substantially, with advances in manufacturing, shifting demand for goods, and with increased international trade. These formerly niche unions also transformed, in most cases amalgamating to form super unions, covering a wide array of trades.

The display includes minute books, correspondence, photographs, leaflets and ephemera, publications and objects. The material covers both very specific aspects of the business or membership of the union, as well as giving insights into the broader social and political conditions of the time.

**COLLECTION RELOCATION PROJECT: Library Projects Coordinator**

I am very pleased to announce that an appointment has been made to the Library Projects Coordinator role. This position is being shared by Rachel Karasick and Luciana Panei and reports to the Associate Director, Library Services. The position has been created for 6 months.

Rachel and Luciana started in the role on Monday 5th November 2018, they going to work 50% on the projects role, in the mornings Monday – Friday and then continue in their substantive roles in their branches in the afternoon.

The major project they will be working on is the relocation of print library resources. The primary focus at the beginning of the project will be a number of smaller projects that will be required to be completed before any major stock movements will take place. All libraries are currently undertaking deselection projects, however the J B Chifley and W K Hancock libraries will have the largest number of items moved within them. The Library's storage area (the Print Repository) at Hume will also require stock relocation therefore the Menzies Library, including the Rare Books Room, will also be affected by this project. The Law Library already has some space which will also be utilised by the project for a collection. There will be a call going out soon to all part-time continuing Library staff, including Stand down staff, Student Library Ambassadors and casual staff to see if they would like to undertake some additional work over the summer break.

I am looking forward to working with Rachel and Luciana as they steer the ANU Library towards our goal of achieving floor free collection spaces as required by the universities industries and at the same time ensuring that the most relevant print collections remain accessible to our academics, researchers and students.

#### ANU Press and Open Access

**Building a Trusted Framework for Coordinating OA Monograph Usage Data.** How to deal with the fact that data about use of ebooks is spread out across many different platforms is a problem for all of us, but it becomes particularly acute when usage rather than sales is a major measure of "success" (as it is for authors, publishers, and funders of open access ebooks). With the support of the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation, KU Research has produced a draft white paper about the issue, which also proposes the formation of a "data trust" framework to alleviate it, as is common in other industries.

**Public Access to Research Data.** The Association of American Universities (AAU) and Association of Public and Land-grant Universities (APLU) have released a report that details principles and recommended actions universities and federal agencies can take to advance timely access to data from federally-sponsored research grants. The report, produced by a working group of research university leaders that AAU and APLU convened, details steps federal agencies can take to facilitate public access to research data in a viable and sustainable manner that advances science in the public interest while minimizing the administrative burden on agencies, universities, and researchers. **Wellcome Trust – new OA policy.** To apply from 2020 – does this mean the end of Green OA? – it requires:

- immediate OA (of publisher version or AAM) via deposition in PubMedCentral or Europe PMC,
- the final journal article or the AAM must be CCBY,
- no payment by the Wellcome for hybrid, authors must post OA preprints for emergencies,
- commitment to DORA or equivalent.

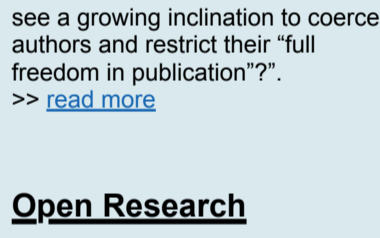
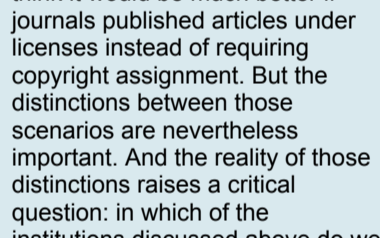

**Open Access, Academic Freedom, and the Spectrum of Coercive Power.** Concludes "So, to sum up: freedom and coercion are spectrum phenomena. Different institutional entities have different capacities to force authors to do what they want them to do. To say that one is deeply concerned about the coercive behavior of entities that have great power over authors (funders, employers, governments) is not to say that one has zero concern over such behavior on the part of those that have less power over them (journals, publishers). In fact, I do have concerns about publishers requiring copyright assignment; I don't agree that such requirements are necessary, and I think it would be much better if journals published articles under copyright assignment. But the distinctions between those scenarios are nevertheless important. And the reality of those distinctions raises a critical question: in which of the institutions discussed above do we see a growing inclination to coerce authors and restrict their "full freedom in publication"?"
