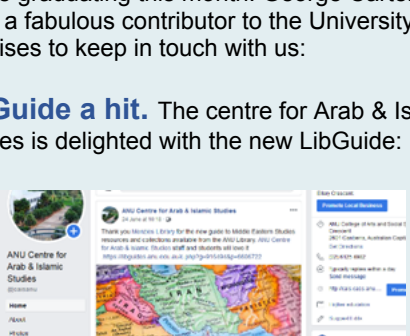

Data protection. The latest OAIC newsletter notes that the Asia Pacific Privacy Authorities (APPA) meeting looked at cross-border privacy, trust marks and certification, digital platforms and data portability.

Copyright. Notes from this fortnight:

- Australian Inclusive Publishing Initiative has released Making Content Accessible: A Guide to Navigating Australian Copyright Law for Disability Access
And while this is a trademark issue you may have seen that Ms. Kardashian West had applied for trademarks for her Kimono lines. She has applied for eight, around variations on the name and its design, and in classes that include Clothing and Apparel Products, Leather Products (not including clothing) and Advertising, Business and Retail Services.
Due to popular demand for streaming of our live events, ALCC is trialling one hour webinars, to give a larger audience a quick copyright essentials or update. Two one hour sessions are scheduled in 2019:
August 7: Copyright Essentials - intended for those who want to learn or brush up on their copyright basics.
August 14: Copyright Extended - looks at the latest updates and copyright practices; assumes either a base knowledge of copyright or attendance at the morning session.
IFLA have published an overview of the EU Copyright Directive and its impacts on cultural heritage institutions and European University Association has published a guide for universities.
ACCC is consulting on its draft guidelines on the repeal of subsection 51(3) of the Competition and Consumer Act 2010 (Cth) (CCA)
In mid-June Standards Australia released a Discussion Paper outlining a shift in the licensing and distribution of Australian Standards and calling for ideas on ways to encourage innovative delivery of standards information.
The ADA has provided a supplementary submission on the Australia-European Union Free Trade Agreement to the government's negotiation team. Where our previous submission focused on the documents that have so far been publicly released for the treaty - including Australia's negotiating principles and the draft chapters released by the European Union (EU) - this submission comments on the possibility of additional provisions being added to the AEUFTA as a result of EU legal changes arising from the Digital Single Market Directive. In particular, the ADA notes it would be extremely concerned if Australia were to make commitments on the EU's new measures relating news publishers' rights (ie the link tax) and intermediary liability for platforms (ie upload filtering).

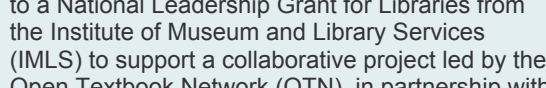
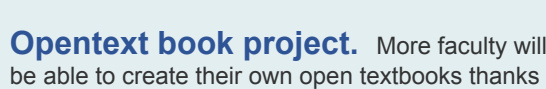

Ebook licence changes cause concern. The American Library Association (ALA) expressed concern about changes announced today by Hachette Book Group (HBG) to its ebook and digital audio book lending model for libraries.

Authorship: are the days of the lone researcher rarer numbered? In recent years there has been emphasis on increasing impact and building networks and visibility through co-authorship has been a new holy grail. Simon Baker finds that single-author publications made up 21.4 per cent of articles, reviews and conference papers indexed in Elsevier's Scopus database in 2018, a share that had almost halved by 2017 to 10.8 per cent. New publishing connects users to the materials they need. OCLC recently signed agreements with 12 publishers to ensure better discovery and more complete access to popular resources. The agreements add metadata for high-quality electronic and print books, journals, databases, and other learning materials that will make this content discoverable through WorldCat Discovery. In total, OCLC has agreements with over 350 publishers and content providers to supply metadata that facilitates access to key resources. >> read more
