
Administrative Survey. This years Administrative survey was expanded to all staff, not just those ANU8 and above as had been the case in previous years.

The Tune review under David Tune. This article highlights the importance of providing access to archive – "The Tune Review, led by former Department of Finance secretary David Tune, has archives staff and users sounding the alarm over an institution they say has long been neglected by the federal government to the point where it is "starved of funds", haemorrhaging staff and at risk of losing undigitised records.

Elsevier access cut off to University of California Berkeley.

The University of California has been out of contract with Elsevier since January. UC ended negotiations for a new journal subscription contract on February 28, with the support of the system-wide Academic Senate.

The Grounded Instruction Librarian.

Conversations with Library Directors. Out from Elsevier - several library directors share personal anecdotes about their professional experiences, as well as insights into the contemporary demands on library leadership.

Organizing the Work of the Art Museum.

OCLC Research mini-symposium. Held in Leiden on the discovery and use of open (digitized) collections. A summary of the event, focusing on three aspects of the meeting: access to content in digital libraries (IIIF); discovery of this content; and use of the content by scholars is online.

Cultural Competence: Toward a More Robust Conceptualisation.

2018 ACRL Academic Library Trends and Statistics for Carnegie Classifications. A few highlights:

- library expenditures for collection materials averaged \$5.3 million for doctoral degree-granting institutions;
On average, doctoral degree granting institutions spent 77.2% of their materials budgets on ongoing commitments to subscriptions in 2017;
Expenditures for salaries and wages accounted for 55.6% of the total library expenditures on average.
Spending per FTE student averaged \$633 for doctoral/research institutions

Understanding the Landscape of Library Accessibility for Online Materials.

Libraries are the most progressive in terms of accessibility when they maintain the most control over their content.

- National policies and community technical guidelines on accessibility hold more prominence than local or institutional mandates.
Most accessibility training is self-initiated; more infrastructure is needed to train librarians in accessibility mandates and tools.
