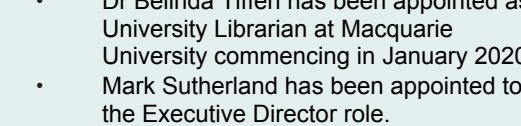
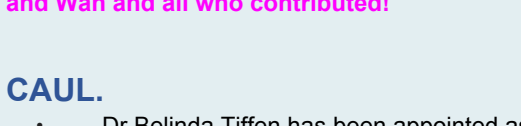
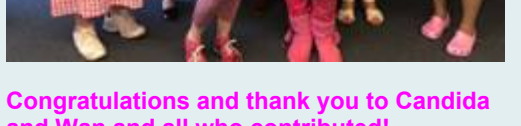
We raised \$470 from the event and Pink Ribbon Events hosted in Menzies Library 2010-2019 total funds to date have reached \$10,000.

Copyright.

- Looking for the really short guide to copyright for teaching at ANU? Well it's now online under the Copyright for Teaching page.
IFLA reports continued resistance to safeguarding libraries and archives internationally. IFLA notes that at the 39th meeting of the WIPO Standing Committee on Copyright and Related Rights (SCCR) in late October there were strong calls for a global treaty for the sector, countered by other Member States, mainly from the EU, advocating for a shift to licensing as a solution instead.
Copyright dispute – it's pirates aho! You will enjoy this report on images of Blackbeard's stolen vessel, Queen Anne's Revenge being argued at the US Supreme Court on Nov. 5. Nautillus registered copyrights for his videos and images that North Carolina used with no license – "The high court will decide who is right at some point in the months following the upcoming arrangements."
Spare Rib archive In February 2019 the British Library determined that if the UK without the European Union (EU) the UK a deal it will be necessary to remove from access the full run of digitised Spare Rib magazines hosted on the Jisc Journals platform. Read more here. The decision to close down the Spare Rib resource once the UK has left the EU was made on the basis of the copyright status of the digitised magazine, which relies heavily on EU orphan works directive.

LibGuides. An amazing year – thank you to everyone working of such a great range of new and updated guides. Hancock Library has now published the last subject guide to be refreshed in the new template – Mathematical Sciences. They have now refreshed 12 subjects guides published in the new template – Engineering, Earth Sciences, Environment & Society, Marine Biology, Medicine, Plant Sciences, Psychology, Biochemistry and Molecular Biology, Astronomy and Astrophysics, and Neurosciences, Epidemiology and Population Health, Thanks to the Information Services Team of Grazyna and Loredana, with this project led by Rachel, for their work.

Library staff contribute to the "fast PhD". Prof Tara Brabazon, Dean of Graduate Research Flinders University has a great new vlog out where she takes time to speak of the value of library assistance to PhD students and encourages students to make us their supporters and allies.

Conflict of Interest. An Issues Paper was produced in mid-2018 to begin the process of reviewing (with the intention of significantly improving) the University's Conflict of Interest (COI) framework. Sambri. Congratulations to Dr Chaitanya Sambri, School of Art and Design. Funding awarded: \$29,000. Collaborating with National University of Singapore and University of Oxford who received an ANU Global Research Partnership Scheme and will be using the Basham slides held in ANU Archives.

National Archives draft updated digitisation specifications. The updated specifications will shortly be published on the National Archives website. The updated digitisation specifications will take effect on 1 December 2019, but provide for a transition period, between December 2019 and December 2020, for the digitisation of paper records for preservation purposes

Elsevier. Always in the news – this time their negotiation strategy with Dutch universities is revealed from a "leaked" memo.

OAIC. The annual report for the OAIC is out now - FOI requests grew by 13% in 2018-19, while applications to review grew by 16%. Privacy complaints rose again by 12%, and there were 950 notifications under the mandatory Notifiable Data Breaches scheme. The health and finance sectors featured strongly as sources of both complaints and data breaches. The commissioners keynote address to the IAPP ANZ Summit emphasised international interoperability, enhancing privacy self-management, organisational accountability and a contemporary approach to regulation.

State of Open Data report 2019. Digital Science have released this new report – highlights: - The majority of researchers want funding withheld and penalties for a lack of data sharing. - 79% were supportive overall of a national mandate for making primary research openly available. - 67% think that funders should withhold funding from, or penalize in other ways, researchers who do not share their data if the funder has mandated that they do so. >> read more
