- "The International Intellectual Property Alliance has asked the US Trade Representative to sanction South Africa for considering the adoption of a progressive Copyright Amendment Bill that would adopt fair use, extend disability access rights to all disabilities, put in place model provisions (from Electronic Information for Libraries model) for education, libraries, archives and museums, require that creators be included in royalties for profitable works, and that rights revert to creators after 25 years". IFLA has already written, and the ADA is writing, a letter to the South African President urging him not to give in to the pressure.

Entry into treated buildings is not permitted from 7am on 27 December through to 5am on 1 January 2019. The chemical to be used is Pestigas (Pyrethrum) and the application method is atomised mist.

While the insecticide to be used has very low toxicity, Royal Pest control advise that prior to the treatment pregnant staff may wish to consult their doctor and discuss any additional requirements with their branch or business manager.

The Human Resources Division is pleased to announce that a new University Work Health and Safety (WHS) induction training module will be available online through Pulse from Monday 25 November 2019. This module supports the implementation of the University Work Health and Safety Management System (WHSMS).

Staff who have previously completed the Compcare Workplace Health & Safety module are not required to complete the new University Work Health and Safety (WHS) Induction unless their WHS Local Training Plan identifies the need to do so.

This module aims to introduce staff to the University's Work Health and Safety (WHS) management system and how it relates to their role. It provides new staff with:

- An overview of the University WHS Management System;
An overview of staff responsibilities under the Work Health and Safety Act 2011 (Cth);
An introduction to general hazards and emergency management at the University;
Guidance on how to report WHS Incidents, Complaints, Concerns and Issues; and
A guide to what WHS information can be found on the University website and how to find it.

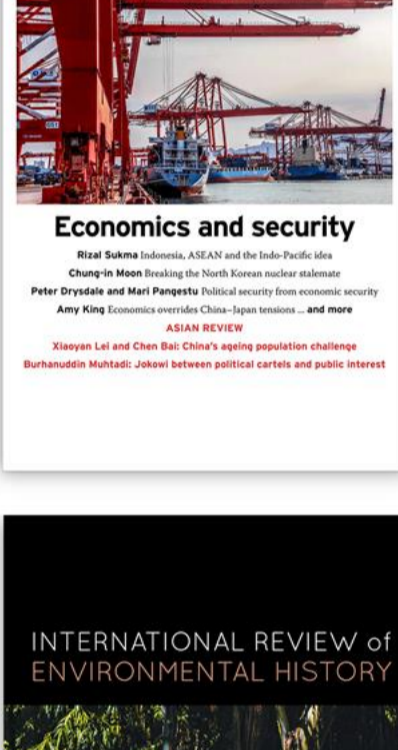
