ANU Archives display: The ANU Archives have installed two displays in the R.G. Menzies Library to mark Women's History Month. Check them out in the foyer and outside the Archives Reading Room throughout March.

Find out more about women in trade unions and the Labor movement from the late 1800s to 2000s. Items on display include minute books of trade union equal pay committees; pamphlets and badges relating to feminism and the women's movement; photographs and short biographies of prominent women in trade unions; and various records from the Union of Australian Women Discover the history of the ANU Women's Studies Program, which ran from 1976-2000. Items on display include a variety of posters, pamphlets, magazines, correspondence and short biographies of those associated with establishing and running the program including Ann Curthovs, Jill

Matthews, Dorothy Broom and Susan Magarey



ANU Library resources and display: A Women and Gender Studies exhibit is on display on Level 2 of the J.B. Chifley Library. We have also recently acquired a number of eBook titles for the Gender Studies collection.

Women's Studies database: ANU Library users now have access to the Women's Studies database, which is a digitised version of microforms lost in the 2018 Chifley flood. Launched in February 2020, Women's Studies contains a breadth of sources over four centuries, providing a vast range of perspectives on the changing roles of women in history. This collection offers access to the works and legacy of many notable and influential women, but also a chance to hear the voices of forgotten and ordinary women

**CLOCKSS archive.** The CLOCKSS Archive have announced that eleven journals have been triggered for open access by the CLOCKSS Board of Directors. The triggers occurred after Medknow, part of Wolters Kluwer, ceased publishing eleven titles in 2019 and the content would no longer be available online. The publications have been preserved in the CLOCKSS Archive and are openly available to the public via a Creative Commons license.

#### Archives.

The Noel Butlin Archives Centre holds numerous shipping and maritime deposits from companies, industry associations (representing employers) and unions (representing employees). A key association that has deposited records is the Maritime Industry Australia Limited (MIAL). On 27 February, a delegation of 23 Maritime Industry Australia Ltd members and staff visited the Acton Underhill where they were welcomed by Kathryn Dan, took a personalised tour of the repositories with Sarah Lethbridge, viewed a range of exhibits, and took part in an interactive role-play that brought shipping records to life. The roleplay skit used the transcript of a dispute over dessert, fruit and the brand of soap, between McIlwraith McEacharn and the Seamen's Union of Australia, 1951, (N380-1248).

Archivist Debra Leigo prepared the activity and displays following intensive appraisal and processing of the latest deposit received from MIAL. The records received in 2016 arrived as 328 cartons stacked across 7 pallets (left). The records are now accessible as N380 and consists of 3504 items housed in 422 boxes (85 linear metres). The records including minute books, constitutions, membership, communications, subject files and industrial disputes, and cover the period 1902 to 2013. They will be of interest for research on industrial relations, transport, wage cases and waterfront industry reform.

Jisc, UK institutions and Wiley "read and publish" agreement. Jisc and Wiley, a global leader in research and education, have struck a four-year "read and publish" agreement that offers researchers at UK universities open access (OA) publishing in all Wiley journals at no cost to them. As part of the new agreement, the proportion of OA articles published by UK researchers will increase from 27% to an estimated 85% in year one, with the potential to reach 100% by 2022. The agreement will also enable institutions and their users to access all of Wiley's journals. .>> read more

IFLA and ICA Launch Joint Statement on Archiving and Privacy. It is wonderful to see leadership on such an important issue. The launch notes: The statement comes following the emergence of a new, tougher, generation of privacy laws around the world. These represent a welcome step towards ensuring that personal information is not misused, and to giving people control over their own data, for example allowing them to choose how companies and others use it, benefit themselves from the insights it offers, and even ask for its deletion. However, while this can help to prevent invasions of privacy by commercial actors, it is necessary to take care to ensure that it does not put at risk the work of libraries and archives in acquiring and preserving works. As the new statement underlines, laws should never allow for, or mandate, the destruction of works held in heritage institutions where this has been selected for preservation and kept because of its enduring cultural significance. Instead, and where decisions have to be made about whether it is appropriate to offer access, there should be support to professionals in developing skills and meaningful codes of ethics and conduct >> read more
