Support for education. The Library continues to support the move to online education. We have set up two study rooms (4.06 and 4.07) on level 4 of the JB Chiffley Library.

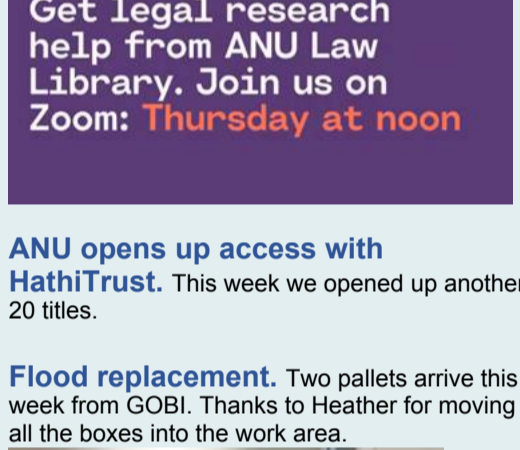
Support for researchers. The ANU Library continues to support research at the University. We are promoting the wealth of online resources including digitised copies of ANU theses from the Library's collection.

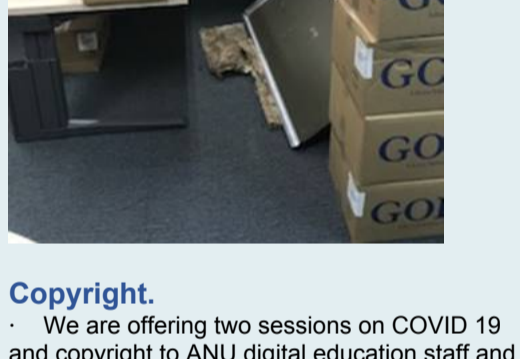

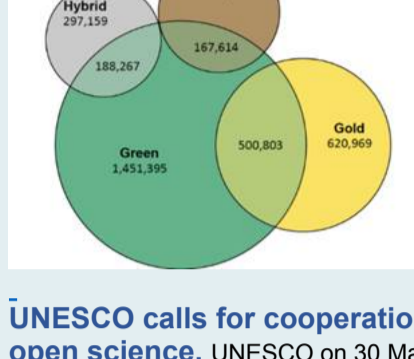

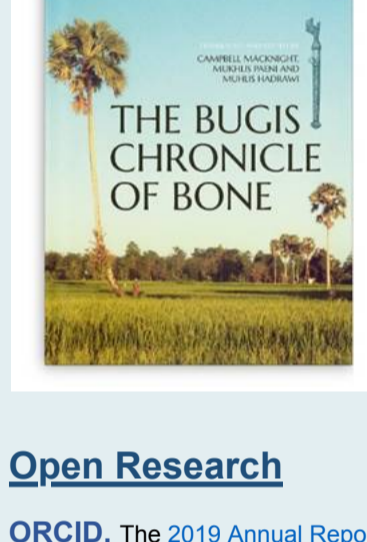

Where is the easy button? Uncovering Ebook usability. Concludes "The researchers did not intend to find an overall "winner" among the platforms. However, the various comparative rankings and success/failure rates may prove valuable, or at least interesting, to libraries facing collection development decisions between these platforms... While content often drives platform choice, nevertheless in situations where the choice may be predetermined—these findings may make libraries proactively aware of usability concerns.

Making Meaning: Collections as Data Symposium. This event took place at State Library of Queensland on Friday 6 March 2020. It was a day for digital innovators, featuring influential and challenging speakers from the research, government, digital humanities and GLAM (Galleries, Libraries, Archives and Museums) sectors.

ARL, CNI, Educause . Reports on Research Library Engagement with Emerging Technologies in Research and Learning. Two reports have been published this week. The first is an executive summary of secondary resources and discussions with research library leaders on their organizations' adoption of emerging technologies.

Checklist for GLAMs and Historical and Heritage Sites. Blue Shield Australia and AICCM have released a Guide to provide guidance for people who are responsible for closing collections of movable cultural heritage in collecting organisations such as archives, galleries, herbaria, historical societies, libraries and museums and at heritage sites during the time of COVID 19

Ithaka S+R US Library Survey 2019. Key Findings
- Library directors continue to perceive the value of their roles—and the roles of their libraries—as changing in the eyes of their supervisors and other higher education leaders.
- Student success remains a top objective for library directors and they see the contributions of their library toward this success most strongly in relation to increasing student learning and enhancing student well-being.
- Priorities continue to shift from collections to services.
- A declining share of directors expect to increase financial support for technology, systems, and infrastructure.
- Spending on electronic books now roughly equals that for print books.
- Half of library directors will likely cancel a major journal package in the next five years.
- Roughly half of library directors are interested in contributing to institutional learning analytics tools.
- Relatively few library directors agree that their library, as well as their broader institution, have well-developed strategies related to equity, diversity, inclusion, and access.
