Open Scholarship Initiative's (OSI)

Plan A. Launched this week The Plan recommends actions around the discovery and design of research and how communities work together to redouble collective efforts to better meet the needs of research in a way that is sustainable to all. Plan A proposes that beginning in 2020 and continuing for a period of five years, the global scholarly communication community will cooperate and collaborate on three main categories of action, in this order of priority: studies, infrastructure development, and education/outreach. .>> read more

For this final phase of establishing the Cooperative, the University of Virginia Library is collaborating with the U.S. National Archives and Records Administration and the 34 other Cooperative members, which together represent a wide variety of archives, libraries, and museums.
