# Yumma Darruwa Ngunnawal

Welcome to Ngunnawal country. This fortnight I thought it might be interesting to highlight the Kambri Ground Map.

Have you wondered about the story of this map as you walk through Kambri?



ANU Learning Communities and ANU Heritage have collaborated to promote awareness and understanding of the importance of the aboriginal heritage on campus. There is a great video on YouTube made two years ago with terrific information on the map and also the Bush Tucker Garden. Dave Johnston, founding Chair of the ANU Indigenous Alumni Network and the ANU Tjbal Centre, discusses the Kambri Ground Map - a gift from the Ngunnawal-Ngambri elders - and the significance of what it represents. It is the heart of Kambri and the ANU, teaching us about the land that is the Ngunnawal-Ngambri country.

# Responsive not Reactive: Building dynamic dashboards to support informed decisions in a mercurial landscape

The presentation from Anna Rubinowski and Michelle Morgan from Swinburne University Library will explore the work their Scholarly Resources Team has undertaken in the last couple of years to build responsive datasets, utilising tools like SharePoint and PowerBI, to create dynamic dashboards. These dashboards make the data accessible to our various stakeholders, are interactive, and support timely evidence-based decisionmaking, including in the evaluation of our eBook acquisition models.



The recommendations are:


- 1. Make the whole-of-university orientation and transition survey a standard survey administered by Planning and Service Performance (PSP).
- 2. Improve the clarity of data on participation in Orientation Week.



# National differences in dissemination and use of open access literature

Marc-André Simard, Gita Ghiasi, Philippe Mongeon, and Vincent Larivière have completed a <u>study</u> that aims to provide a global picture of open access (OA) adoption by countries, using two indicators: publications in OA and references made to articles in OA.

They find that, on average, low-income countries are publishing and citing OA at the highest rate, while upper middle-income countries and higher-income countries publish and cite OA articles at below world-average rates. These results highlight national differences in OA uptake and suggest that more OA initiatives at the institutional, national, and international levels are needed to support wider adoption of open scholarship.

# Bringing Data to Life: Co-Designing a Language Data Commons Recap

The event was moderated by Gooreng Gooreng man Grant Sarra, and attended by over 70 people from academia and the GLAM sector both in person and online on 4 August 2022.

# navigate cross-border legal and ethical issues

UC Berkeley Library and Internet Archive have <u>announced</u> that the <u>National</u> <u>Endowment for the Humanities</u> (NEH) has <u>awarded</u> nearly \$50,000 to study legal and ethical issues in cross-border text data mining. The funding was made possible through NEH's <u>Digital Humanities</u> <u>Advancement Grant program</u>.

NEH funding for the project, entitled Legal Literacies for Text Data Mining – Cross Border ("LLTDM-X"), will support research and analysis to address law and policy issues faced by U.S. digital humanities practitioners whose text data mining research and practice intersects with foreign-held or licensed content, or involves international research collaborations.

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
