

Welcome to Ngunnawal country.

ANU Press publishes outstanding works on indigenous Australians including Aboriginal history and many monographs. Australian Dictionary of Biography, Volume 19 1991–1995 (A–Z) is an extraordinary volume containing the biographies of 680 individuals including Wiradjuri midwife and Ngunnawal Elder Violet Bulger; Aboriginal rights activist, poet, playwright and artist Kevin Gilbert; and Torres Strait Islander community leader and land rights campaigner Eddie Mabo.

For insights into writing Indigenous biographies and autobiographies I highly recommend Indigenous Biography and Autobiography (edited by Peter Read, Frances Peters-Little, Anna Haebich) and An Indigenous Australian Dictionary of Biography (by Shino Konishi), published in 'True Biographies of Nations?' The Cultural Journeys of Dictionaries of National Biography (edited by Karen Fox) both are published by ANU Press.

The marvellous National Centre of Biography also have a wealth of information in the Indigenous Australian Dictionary of Biography and the Australian Dictionary of Biography.

UNESCO checklist for open access publishers on implementing the UNESCO recommendation on Open Science

The document is part of the UNESCO Open Science Toolkit, designed to support implementation of the UNESCO Recommendation on Open Science. It has been produced in partnership with the Open Access Scholarly Publishing Association (OASPA), a diverse community of organisations engaged in open scholarship.

The aim is to provide practical assistance to the open access publishing community to better understand the recommendation by highlighting areas that apply to open access publishers who wish to support its implementation.

Landscape study of small journal publishers transitioning to open access (OA)

Knowledge Exchange (KE) and the German Centre for Higher Education Research and Science Studies (DZHW) have published an initial Landscape study of small journal publishers. This study includes a practical examination of small publishers which helps the research community to identify the challenges they may face in successfully transitioning to open access.

Based on the methodology presented at the beginning of the report, the data collected allows us to draw a panorama of small academic publishing houses within the six KE countries. The study investigates how many small publishers in these countries can be identified in large bibliographic databases and looks at several characteristics of these publishers. It also seeks to understand their attributes such as the business model (open access, closed or a combination thereof), language, discipline, lifespan, changes in publisher, periodicity and age among others. The data is shared in report.

LibAnswers is a searchable knowledge base of frequentlyasked questions about research, writing, citing and more. JSTOR and a cohort of leading university presses <u>announced Path to Open</u>, a program to support the open access publication of new groundbreaking scholarly books that will bring diverse perspectives and research to millions of people.

Launching as a pilot, Path to Open libraries will contribute funds to enable participating presses to publish new books that will transition from licensed to open access within three years of publication. The initial pilot will produce about one thousand open access monographs. If successful, it will lay the foundation for an entirely new way to fund long-form scholarship while vastly increasing its impact.






Monthly breakdown


